

witnesses, including: Irvin Francis Kehewin; Victor David John; Harvey Joseph Young Chief; and, Harold Watchmaker. The Claimant shall provide Will-Say statements for its oral history witnesses to the Respondent on or before **January 16, 2017**.

[2] The Parties also noted the provision in their Oral History Protocol as filed with the Tribunal setting out that “[i]f the Respondent intends to raise a preliminary objection to the admissibility of evidence based on the content of the Will-Say statement(s), the Respondent will inform the Claimant of this within two months after receipt of the Will-Say statement(s).”

[3] The oral history evidence hearing dates/duration, location, need for an interpreter and other related details necessary for the conduct of such a hearing will be discussed at the next CMC.

[4] The Parties confirmed that they are working cooperatively on a Common Book of Documents and an Agreed Statement of Facts, both of which are in progress, but both of which cannot be finalized until expert reports are completed and the oral history evidence hearing has taken place.

[5] The Claimant also indicated that its expert report cannot be completed until the expert has had the opportunity to review the oral history testimony of the Claimant and all of the documents as produced by the Respondent to date.

[6] The next CMC will be held by teleconference on **February 3, 2017**, at 1:00 P.M., Eastern Time (Ottawa).
